





National Guidelines for Child and Youth Behavioral Health Crisis Care

- Someone to Talk To: Crisis Call Centers
- Someone to Respond: Mobile Response Teams
- Safe Place to Be: Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Services

Stress Model of Crisis



Core Components

- Someone to talk to: Crisis Call Centers –Trigger Event & Escalation Phase
- Someone to Respond: Escalation Phase & Outburst
- Safe Place to Be: Outburst (crisis) & Recovery

Taking a closer look...

- It is in the Recovery Phase that healing, recovering, and relapse planning can occur.
- It is also in the Recovery Phase that the most hurt and damage can be inflected




